Living the high life in Austria

La Perla Living's portfolio of property developments is not only expanding rapidly, but it's also becoming increasingly diverse. The company is proud to announce its latest addition: not just one, but two residential developments amid the majestic mountains of Austria. Perfect in any season for those who love the outdoors, from the lush green of the hills and valleys to the crisp, white slopes of the mountains.

Alpine apartments and lakeside lodges

Eleven luxurious lodges, situated around a small lake, and ten spacious apartments in two traditional-style buildings make up this prestigious new project in Hinterthal. Homeowners will be able to enjoy a wealth of recreational activities in all seasons as well as savour the cosy and inviting Austrian mountain village atmosphere.

Once upon a time, there was a grand old hotel in the Austrian village of Hinterthal, so welcoming that guests returned there year after year. Its name was Clubhotel Hinterthal, a unique residence built around a traditional 17th-century farmhouse. Unfortunately, time took its toll on the hotel, which stood vacant since 1990. However, its future now looks bright again, as La Perla Living is restoring the building to its former splendour. With three floors and an underground parking garage, connected via a glass elevator, the Clubhotel will house nine comfortable apartments. Varying in size and layout, they all feature entresols and spacious balconies, or terraces and gardens on the ground floor.

Ski right up to your front door

In addition to the restored hotel building, the development consists of 11 individual lakeside lodges and Amelia's Corner, a new building close to and in the same style as the Clubhotel. Amelia's Corner will feature a reception area with La Perla Living's Club desk, and a restaurant built around a central fireplace. There will be a small bar and a wine cellar in the basement, and the plans for the first floor provide for either an exclusive 160m² apartment or two separate ones, as required.

The Clubhotel sits on the shores of a small lake called the Florysee, and the 11 separate lodges are built around it. "All lodges will be named after one of the mountain peaks that surround Hinterthal," explains project architect Onno de Vries. "For instance, our first one is called Lodge Selbhorn." Michael Huisman, Director of Investments at La Perla Living, is eager to point out that the plot of land is right at the bottom of a ski slope, with the ski lift coming right down to it. "You can just put your skis on right outside your own home," says Michael, touching on one of the many delightful appeals of this development.





The best of alpine architecture

Onno de Vries, who has fond childhood memories of the hotel and its surroundings, is proud to bring Clubhotel Hinterthal back to life. "We let the best traditions of alpine architecture inspire us for this project's designs," says Onno. "We wanted to maintain the feeling of a typical Austrian village, so we're using natural stone from the surrounding mountains and wood that is native to the area. Dark copper roofs will put the finishing touch on the traditional, white-plastered buildings."

The Hinterthal area offers endless recreational activities in all seasons, including active outdoor sports such as hiking, horseriding, golfing and almost year-round skiing. The city of Salzburg with its theatres, museums and galleries is only an hour away, and the wide variety of events held in the region include castle, village, lake, city and alpine festivals. La Perla Living envisages that Hinterthal home buyers will quickly become part of the local community. "I'm sure that people will immediately feel at home here," says Onno. "After all, creating that 'at home' feeling was the main idea behind our entire design of Clubhotel Hinterthal."

Golf in summer, skiing in winter

In the same valley, near Maria Alm, another La Perla Living development is underway right on a professional 18-hole golf course. Although still in their very early stages, the plans reveal a typical Austrian mountain village with some 120 apartments. This large-scale development with relatively smaller-size apartments represents a new departure for La Perla Living.

One of Austria's most beautiful alpine championship courses, Golfclub Urslautal is popular with big-name golf players and international celebrities. The 6,030m par 71 course, with an impressive 270m driving range and 80 tees, presents both beginners and experienced golfers with a challenging golfing experience. The owner of the Golfclub liked the idea of having suitable accommodation right by the course, which offers stunning views of the surrounding snow-topped mountains, but was waiting to find the right partner. He has now found that partner in La Perla Living, which can offer the high standards and luxurious atmosphere to match the Golfclub's reputation.

"Fifteen traditional-style buildings will be dotted around the new golf village," says project architect Onno de Vries. "All apartments will feature a balcony with panoramic views, and come with an underground parking space and a storeroom for skis and golf clubs." World-class skiing and golf throughout the year, all in a gorgeous mountain setting, with your own luxury apartment to retreat to at night – surely the ideal location for all lovers of the great outdoors!

breezier and less elaborate than in Spain."



A charming village emerges

The La Heredia de Monte Mayor project consists of 53 homes, while two similar projects are planned for the future, making a grand total of approximately 150 residences. The first phase of 21 homes, most of which have already been sold, is nearing completion, while construction of the second phase (an additional 14 homes) is underway and should be finished early next year. The remaining 18, in the third phase, are set to be completed by the end of 2005. With its gorgeous landscaping, fountains and cobbled streets, the new village will bear a strong resemblance to La Perla Living's successful first Andalusian-style village, La Perla de

The colourful townhouses line winding streets on the terraced hillside, and although they share one overall architectural style, no two houses are the same. They will have individualised roofs finished in old Arabic tiles with traditional-style eaves, unique chimneys and distinctive antique wooden doors. Varying from 150 to 300m² in size, and with two, three or four bedrooms, there are houses with or without a garden, houses with a private plunge pool, and townhouses that resemble villas. The terraces and balconies of the homes will be embellished with hand-pressed clay tiles, and decorative wroughtiron grills will adorn the windows and French doors. Inside, the houses will feature a fireplace with a decorated plaster chimney breast, a fully equipped kitchen in wood with a marble worktop, and dining and living room floors made of clay combined with marble, wood or tiles, depending on the owner's preference.

Wake up and tee off

Residents of La Heredia de Monte Mayor will be able to fully benefit from the fact that the village is part of the Monte Mayor Golf & Country Club. All home buyers will be entitled to club membership, enabling them to take advantage of all the amenities offered at the Club. These not only include the golf course, but also tennis courts, a gymnasium and swimming pools, with more facilities, such as a health club and spa, in the planning. Also within the grounds are a Golf Pro Shop and a La Perla Café, while a new clubhouse with restaurant is currently on the drawing board.

With its wide range of facilities and easy accessibility (just 45 minutes from the international airports in Malaga and Gibraltar), La Heredia de Monte Mayor will surely appeal to successful professionals. The relaxing atmosphere will provide a welcome change from their usual hectic lifestyle - although the welldeveloped infrastructure will allow them to work from there as well, if they so choose. The recreational activities are certainly attractive for families with children, but also for couples whose children have left home, La Heredia de Monte Mayor will feel like heaven on earth. Among them were the famous J-Class vessels *Endeavour* and *Ranger*, as well as the 77-foot *Grote Meid*, its white sails with the La Perla Living name and logo proudly billowing in the wind.

Taking part in its first regatta ever, the schooner won third prize in Classic Class A, which had eight contestants. "We took part in three races," explains Paul van Koelen, captain of *Grote Meid*. "We finished first in one of the races, and fourth in the other two, which resulted in third prize overall." The Classic Class is for yachts with a full keel and less than 50 years old. Other classes included one for older yachts (the Vintage Class) and one for newly-built but classic-style yachts (the Spirit of Tradition Class).

During Antigua Sailing Week (25 April-1 May), guests of La Perla Living enjoyed the high-speed races up close from the decks of the schooner, which sailed alongside the contesting yachts. Paul also took those interested in La Perla Living's new development project out for a trip around NonSuch Bay, leaving everyone with a delightful and memorable impression of what life could be like living there.

NonSuch Bay sales off to a good start



La Perla Living's new Antigua office, which officially opens 1 July, has already received several reservations and a number of interested buyers are due to fly to Antigua once the floor plans are ready in June to discuss the architectural details of their future home.

La Perla Living expects the entire project to be completed within 24 months of the start of construction.



The final phase will also feature the same highquality materials and finishes as the rest of La Perla de La Heredia, including the red pine, Macael marble, polished brass, and Arabic and hand-pressed clay tiles.

Construction is planned in two phases, with the first homes set to be completed in the first half of next year. All 28 villas and townhouses should be ready to move into before the end of 2005. The properties at El Castillo have certainly attracted a lot of interest, as 24 of them had already been sold off plan at the time of going to press.

Vietnam – land of beauty and promise

Once considered inaccessible and impoverished, Vietnam has broken free of its former constraints and is now enjoying a cultural and economic resurgence, making it one of South-East Asia's most interesting and attractive destinations. That's why La Perla Living is considering this beautiful country as a possible new development location.

Often referred to today as the next 'Asian tiger', Vietnam is currently going through the latest in a long line of fascinating transformations. From the sophisticated Dong Son culture of the 3rd century BC to the end of French rule in 1945, the country has experienced a dazzling variety of conquerors and cultures, including the Indianised kingdom of Funan, the Hindu kingdom of Champa, and a thousand years of Chinese rule. Now, with the conflicts of the mid-20th century well behind it, ongoing economic reforms are transforming the republic once again – this time into a booming free-market economy with low inflation and a rapidly developing infrastructure. No longer one of the poor children of Asia, Vietnam is an increasingly safe, stable and accessible destination with a highly attractive investment climate. Yet the cost of living is still remarkably low.

Land of contrasts

Shaped like an elongated 'S', Vietnam shares borders with China, Laos and Cambodia, while its eastern coast stretches out over 3,200km along the South China Sea. It is a land of striking contrasts, with vast differences in terrain between the mountains in the far north and the low, flat delta in the south, divided by the central coast and highlands. As an intricate tapestry of soaring peaks, tropical forests, lush fields, sinuous rivers and golden beaches, Vietnam's natural beauty is breathtaking. Inland, the countryside is dotted with tranquil villages, while the fertile deltas and coastal areas offer captivating views of endless green rice paddies tended by women in cone-shaped hats. On the central coast, the white sandy beaches and clear turquoise waters around Nha Trang, known as the Mediterranean of Vietnam, are a particularly stunning and relaxing retreat, with a number of exclusive beach resorts located there.

Like its landscape, Vietnam's climate is multi-faceted, with wet and dry seasons varying across the country. Although winters in the northern mountainous areas can get quite cold, the country's south enjoys a year-round tropical climate. Nha Trang is said to enjoy the very best of Vietnam's climates, unaffected by the south's summer monsoon, and with an average annual temperature of a balmy 26 °C.

Enchanting cities

Vietnam's graceful cities are also captivating in their diversity, from the leafy capital of Hanoi in the north to Ho Chi Minh City (formerly Saigon) in the south, which is the country's dynamic and modern economic centre, complete with glittering skyscrapers housing many international hotels and companies. Other interesting cities include the ancient capital of Hué, one of Vietnam's main cultural, religious and educational centres, and Dalat, the artistic jewel of the central highlands, with its bustling café culture. Although very different, most major Vietnamese cities are a harmonious blend of old and new, featuring charming old neighbourhoods with colonial French houses, shaded boulevards, fascinating pagodas, temples and churches, botanical gardens, and excellent museums, alongside modern urban facilities.

A wealth of traditions

With a population made up of 54 different ethnic groups and a history that stretches back some 4,000 years, Vietnam has a vibrant cultural heritage, which it has managed to preserve despite its rapid development. This includes many fascinating Buddhist temples and monasteries (Buddhism is Vietnam's principal religion), as well as rich artistic traditions such as silk painting, puppetry and lacquerware. It also includes the wonderful local cuisine, flavoured with distinct herbs and spices. Experiencing these wonders first-hand is made all the easier thanks to the openness, warmth and hospitality of the Vietnamese, who make all visitors feel welcome, no matter where they are from.

Fulfilling Vietnam's promise

La Perla Living has been quick to recognise Vietnam's superb qualities and enormous potential, and is currently scouting for suitable locations to develop its first Asian community. Any resulting development will, of course, bear La Perla Living's signature – offering buyers a great investment opportunity as well as an exceptional and unique living experience in this shining new Pearl

Andausia Costa del Sol — 9th Festival of the knife - Nontron



Festival International de Música y Danza - Granada

23 June-3 July: Granada's 53rd music and dance festival offers something for everyone, from symphonic music to chamber music, opera, Spanish zarzuela and, of course, the very best flamenco. One of the festival's highlights is the world premiere of a spectacular new show, Pastora 1922, starring homegrown flamenco singer Estrella Morente and taking place at the historic enclave Patio de los Aliibes on 29 June.

Fiesta de la Virgen del Carmen – fishing towns and villages —

16 July: On this evening, coastal fishing towns and villages parade effigies of La Virgen del Carmen, the protectress of seamen, through the streets before setting sail on a flower-adorned boat, while brass bands play, crowds cheer and fireworks fill the sky. Celebrations vary from town to town, but a good place to see this fiesta is **Estepona**, where the Virgen del Carmen is one of the most beloved saints.

MAC21 Art Fair - Marbella -

21-25 July: MAC21 is the 7th International Contemporary Art Fair of Art Galleries of Marbella City. This year, the Fair will feature 20thand 21st-century artworks, including paintings and drawings, engravings, sculptures, photographs, installation art and experimental artwork. The Fair will be held at the Marbella Exhibition & Congress Centre and will be open to the general public from 6pm to 11pm.

Feria de Malaga - Malaga



14-22 August: During Malaga's summer fair, the city centre is transformed into an exuberant street party, with plenty of music and dance. Held around the Margues de Larios, the fair commemmorates the re-conquest of Malaga from the Moors in 1487. Expect fireworks, lots of sherry, decorated food stalls selling local delicacies, and people in traditional costumes. Summer fairs are held in every Andalusian town and village, spread out between April and October.

Feu d'artifice du 14 Juillet - Périgueux, Saint Yriex La Perche —

14 July: Bastille Day is marked by festive events across France, and the Dordogne is no exception. The festivities in both Périqueux and Saint Yriex La Perche include spectacular fireworks displays set to music.

Festival of Mimos - Périgueux

2-8 August: Held since 1983, Mimos is the world's most important annual contemporary mime festival. A variety of free performances will take place in Périqueux's picturesque streets, while mime enthusiasts can enjoy more elaborate shows at venues such as Le Theatre and Le Palace, and even take part in mime workshops.



7-8 August: Nontron is famous for its intricately hand-decorated knives, manufactured at the Couteau de Nontron knife factory for at least 500 years. The two-day Fête du Couteau with its many demonstrations offers a rare opportunity to see international knife manufacturers and

Antigua Carnival – St John's

23 July-3 August: Antigua's Carnival is the highlight of the island's entertainment calendar.
